Pastor Robert's Reflections

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am huge fan of Star Trek particularly the Next Generation series which ran during my teen years. Besides the characters, cool new worlds, and species that are introduced throughout the series, what drew me back week after week was seeing how these characters would deal with a situation that challenged their set moral code.

Just in case you don't know anything about Star Trek, all the Characters are part of a group called "Starfleet" who are explorers in the future guided by what is called "The Prime Directive" which dictates how they should deal with new species they encounter. They are all part of a multispecies society where everything is shared and they do their best to settle disputes between various people in order to avoid violent conflicts. In nearly every episode they are presented with situations that cause them to question this strict moral code by which they live and must learn to resolve the issue by either using that code, finding a way around it, or breaking it. No matter how the situation resolves there are both positive and negative consequences that our protagonists have to deal with, and while many of the situations may seem bizarre from our 21st century perspective each situation is rooted in moral dilemmas that nearly all human beings encounter, or at least read about, throughout their lives.

What happens if our moral code causes an innocent person to get hurt?

What if we are called to do no violence, yet there is someone out there who must be stopped from hurting others?

Transition Committee Survey Report

Purpose, Giftedness & Mission

The Transition Committee is tasked with completing a <u>Ministry Site Profile</u> (MSP) document in preparation for calling a new pastor. A survey of members was conducted to gather data regarding our Purpose, Giftedness and Mission. The questions we need to answer from the MSP are as follows:

<u>Mission:</u> In light of the way you have described your ministry context in this Ministry Site Profile, what are the top three mission priorities which, if accomplished, hold the most promise for the continued development of this ministry?

The current Prince of Life mission statement reads as follows:

Our mission is to know the love of God in Jesus Christ, and to share that love through word and action.

How do we discern between solutions where one solution resolves immediate issues, yet may cause long term issues, or a solution that may cause harm in the short term but help in the long term?

How do we deal with those who do not share our moral code, yet we must somehow get along?

How do we deal with situations that call our moral code into question? Do we adapt or dig our heals in?

How should we deal with these and other questions?

Well before I try to answer any of those questions. I would like to bring up another TV show that just ended its run a few years ago, Breaking Bad. If you are unfamiliar with this show its basic concept revolves around the idea of how a seemingly normal person could potentially become an evil person without fully realizing it. The story focuses on a middle-aged high school science teacher who is diagnosed with terminal cancer and is looking for a way to make sure his family is financially secure after he passes. This leads him into the business of manufacturing and selling Methamphetamines. As he falls deeper and deeper into the drug world doing things he never thought himself capable of he keeps finding justification for his actions in the idea that all of this is for his family. This program provides a great (though extreme) example regarding how someone, when working in isolation can easily find excuses as to why they should compromise their beliefs. Sure the protagonist does have family and friends he could look to for support, but he keeps them all in the dark as to what his true purposes are thus only trusting his own judgment.

In contrast to this the characters in Star Trek do everything as a community, and it is when one of them decides to act out of self-interest rather then the good of the community that the group suffers. For me these two programs help reinforce the Bible's teachings about being accountable toward each other, such as:

"Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm alone? And though one might prevail against another, two will withstand one. A threefold cord is not quickly broken."

Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

I can't count the number of times I have heard people tell me, "I already know Jesus, I don't need to go to Church." Unfortunately knowing Jesus is different than being a follower of Christ, and to be a follower of Christ one must be a part of a faith community. As a community we hold each other accountable to the faith based morality that we all share. When people attempt to follow Jesus on their own it is too easy to continually compromise their beliefs to the point where Jesus stands up for everything we want him to stand up for, rather than what Christ actually stands for.

Accountability and community are essential in our lives as Christians and it is empowering to see people working together to move Prince of Life forward, and I look forward to seeing where this community goes in the future.

Or in Other words:

This is Prince of Life Lutheran Church, continuing its 45-year mission, to spread Gods love, to new people, and new communities, to boldly proclaim God's love in ways nobody has done before!

The high level of agreement with these statements is an indication that we all recognize God has blessed us with many gifts for use in His kingdom. What other gifts and resources do you think are present at Prince of Life that should be part of fulfilling our mission?
Nearly a dozen people offered various suggestions concerning other gifts we possess. Several of these ideas mesh well with the statements above. In general, these suggestions highlight a very optimistic outlook toward carrying out our shared mission.
The following statements are included to determine whether we share a common understanding of what potential obstacles lay ahead on the path to fulfilling our mission.
Insufficient knowledge and understanding as to how best to effectively communicate and connect with people in the larger community given the rapidly evolving social media cools used by the modern world.

More than two thirds of all surveys indicated agreement that these are real obstacles facing Prince of Life.

What additional obstacles do you see that may stand in the way of Prince of Life fulfilling its mission?

Seventeen people offered comments about other obstacles which they perceive lie ahead for this congregation. A key element in several of these responses was they identified a belief that, as a people of faith with many gifts, we can overcome such obstacles. Other ideas offered will provide insight for the Transition Committee to flesh out our responses on the Ministry Site Profile.

Examples of high mission priorities for Prince of Life that have the most promise for continued development in terms of fulfilling our mission are listed below:

Expansion of our rich and engaging Worship Life:
Use the musical skills/talents and leadership in the congregation along with a visionary new pasto to build on the current worship dynamics and explore additional ways to engage people in meaningful and uplifting new worship experiences that may draw in new participants.

Use our facility as a community hub for spiritual connectedness:

While many community groups use the Prince of Life building on a regular basis, we recognize that there is potential to do so much more. Ideas such as day care for the children of working parents seems to have generated considerable interest. Using our assets to meet the needs of the larger community has the potential for making connections with people that have no relationship to Prince of Life, but like people everywhere are needing a place where they can connect with others to achieve a sense of belonging. Providing a place for people to gather as they explore issues related to social and economic justice, community safety, a clean environment, mental health, wellness, homelessness/housing, hunger, employment, education, and/or even culture is one potential way to bring people together. There is a need for God's faithful people to speak up and provide leadership to help our society to address these issues.

Child, Youth, and Family Service Committee

In April, we started talks with the Clackamas County Children's Commission, the independent non-profit that runs the Head Start program in Clackamas County, about possible partnership between them and Prince of Life. We shared a broad long term vision that could start with the use of a portion of our lower floor for 2 Head Start classrooms, then eventually leasing the back area of our land and building a permanent facility for Head Start. Once that was built they would move the classes there and expand their operations to include afterschool care, and possibly a comprehensive childcare program that includes a pilot program of blended Head Start eligible children and Head Start non-eligible children. That is a pretty tall order and both groups decided we need to take it one step at a time.

Studying the feasibility and developing a plan is the first step. The Children's Commission will determine first if there is a geographical need for the longer full day Head Start program here. Right now, they know there is a waiting list for that program at their Clackamas Community College site. They also want to discuss the full idea with their Board of Directors and get permission to spend time developing the vision and negotiating a long-term plan.

This plan was presented to the POL Church Council at their April 11th meeting. The Council agreed to have the Child, Youth, and Family Service Committee continue to negotiate these ideas in developing a partnership with the Clackamas County Children's Commission.

We've got a start, but it is far from certain that our idea will progress into the full vision. It could stop at any point along the way. Before any changes are made by Head Start to our downstairs, there will be a full comprehensive negotiated plan in writing that covers the entire concept. The Church Council and the congregation will both have to approve that plan.

In the meantime, the CYF members are your resource for information. We used our entire April meeting to report all the information we had gleaned so far and made plans for who is handling various aspects of negotiations over the next month.

For the Love of All Creation

What if there was a simple way to address climate crisis—directly and effectively—without having to rely on politicians? Would we take the personal chance to make the needed social changes in the way we prepare and share our food?

Prince of Life youth and families have begun to explore some of these alternatives!
Wednesday, March 30, seven youth and nine adults planted three beds of cabbage and kale at Acres of Abundant Grace in Canby, as part of an exciting ground-to-plate "kid's kitchen" project sponsored by a year-old ministry known as Climate Café.

During Spring Break, this hardy group of adventurers set out—in between rainstorms—to discover hands-on what it would be like to help generate a community meal "from the ground up." Folks from Prince of Life, ELCA, gathered at a local farm, together with members of Christ the Healer, UCC, to learn, hands-on, about regenerative farming and to help plant produce that will source delicious, nutritious and ecologically friend meals at the end of the growing season. We also visited a lively flock of Nigerian goats on the neighboring farm and picnicked together afterwards.

What is Climate Café? In a nutshell, it's an effort to INVITE folks with all different kinds of beliefs to enjoy a meal that is *locally sourced*, plant based, regeneratively grown, sustainably prepared with a low carbon footprint.

Inspirational learning—from poetry and drama to talks by the farmers and demonstrations by the chefs are also part of the program.

Climate Café has been in existence for over a year now, popping up in various greater Portland venues such as Hillsdale Community Church and St. Luke, ELCA among others. This interfaith, intergenerational effort is based on the belief that adjusting the way we eat goes a long way to addressing climate crisis. Based on a gift economy in which doners with plentiful resources share with diners who have

less to give, Climate Café so far is an all-volunteer effort.

Since it is the youth who are inheriting an earth that has already been damaged, it will be the energy and insight of youngsters working alongside elders that tip the ecological balance of our planet.

Reaching out to churches, community groups, and non-industrial farms, Climate Café is in the process of developing an allied children and youth component to promote greater awareness of positive solutions to climate change and to generate involvement in sustainable and regenerative growing practices.
