Pastor Robert's Reflections

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, "24He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; 25but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. 26So when the plants came up and

bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well.

²⁷And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' ²⁸He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' ²⁹But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them.

³⁰Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

³⁶Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." ³⁷He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; ³⁸the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, ³⁹and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels.

⁴⁰Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. ⁴¹The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, ⁴²and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. ⁴³Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. anyone with ears listen!"-Matthew 13:24–30, 36 –43

This is one of those passages that bothers me a lot and I constantly find myself going back and looking at it because there are a few different ways to look at it. The typical Lutheran way of understanding this passage is to say that we are both weeds and wheat aka sinner and saint. This is based upon Martin Luther's idea that human beings are capable of not only terrible acts of cruelty and hate but also profound acts of love and care towards those around them. There is nothing wrong with that interpretation, I love it but I would like to look at it in a slightly different way.

Are there people in this world that are truly unredeemable? If so how should we as people react to them? As we have looked deeper and deeper into the study of the human mind we have deduced that there are human beings that could be considered evil, or at least manifest traits that make them unable to empathize with others and instead only look upon other people as things to manipulate and control.

Yet if we proclaim that there are people among us that are evil and therefore without redemption then we risk falling into the trap of casting judgment on others by giving ourselves an excuse to dismiss those whom we find unworthy of our attention.

Unfortunately throughout the history of the Christian Church, all the way up to today, there have been those who have used passages such as this to justify either casting out those who they disagree with, or passing judgment upon those who are different.

As a teenager I witnessed a pastor out a gay man in front of the entire congregation asking him to repent then and there. Feeling publicly humiliated the young man not only left the building but would subsequently denounce his Christian faith. During my Internship a man requested communion after beating his wife and child in front of several witnesses without remorse.

The pastor reluctantly gave the young man communion deciding that it was not up to him to pass judgment. One pastor took it upon himself

to serve as judge while another left that role to God.

Each of us is truly a unique child of God and each of us looks out at the world in our own unique way. This is something to be celebrated yet we are constantly putting each other into categories related to different degrees of right and wrong, based upon our own unique perspectives of what constitutes right and wrong.

As some of you may know, I was not always the nice little goody two shoes you see before you my past is a little more colorful. Yet am I pure evil? I don't think so.

In the same way I have known people throughout my life who were pretty bad when I met them yet ended up good, or were good when I met them then later did some pretty bad things based on my own perception of right and wrong. This could be said about most people depending upon when and how you met them. There are People who always did good and helped others, then one day turned selfish and destructive toward those around them, and people who lied and cheated then turned into honest and fair later in life. So how are we to judge who is truly evil?

In our Gospel lesson God promises us that in the end those who are evil will be separated from those who are good. As human beings we should recognize our limited abilities in perceiving the entirety of a person. For while we may be able to set up laws to punish people for their actions it is not our place to judge another person as evil, we can only see their actions not the entire person and trust that in the end just as the Gospel says those who are truly evil will be judged just as those who are not will be judged as well.

In the meantime the only thing we can control is ourselves and how we interact with the world around us, and we are called to interact with that world in a positive way.

Child, Youth, and Family Service Committee

The big news this past month is that we learned that the Clackamas County Children's Commission (HeadStart) is still willing to explore the possibilities of partnership in building a childcare facility on our site. You'll remember last month that temporary use of our building for classes did not pan out.

A five-member group was able to meet with the Executive Director Darcee Kilsdonk on Zoom to confirm this and lay out next steps. This process is likely to take till 2025 to see construction start on our property. That would be if everything pans out.

First step is to nail down the building size possibilities and meet with the City of Oregon City Planning Department to see if they will allow it and make sure they will approve a zoning change for that building. The best person to do this is the contracted architect for HeadStart, Tim. He will solicit our help in doing this, but with his other projects for HeadStart, noticeable progress won't occur till September.

We have hope that this will continue to progress and we will keep you apprised of the progress.

New Clackamas County-Wide Community Planning Project

As a result of the CYF Committee's participation in the Clackamas County Childcare for All Coalition, we were approached to participate in the Clackamas County-Wide Community Planning Project sponsored by the Clackamas County Workforce Partnership.

Our CYF Committee and Council President John Mohlis agreed that this was a good thing to do, so the information about the project was forwarded to the POL Church Council ahead of their scheduled 7/2023 meeting. The Church Council approved our participation and agreed to have Janet Mann serve as POL representative, with no decision-making authority for our congregation. The Church Council will make the ongoing decisions about our participation in the project.

What is this? The Clackamas Workforce
Partnership is not part of the county
government. Clackamas Workforce
Partnership a non-governmental, non-profit
that receives and disperses funding from the
Federal Government for Workforce
Development in Clackamas County. They
have a board made up of community
volunteers that oversees this process and
supervises the disbursement and use of funds
to accomplish their goals. Clackamas

Community College, apprenticeship programs, and various other groups actually receive and use the funds.

As part of the process, they need to survey the needs in the community every 3 years. This time, Bridget Dazey, their Executive Director, decided it would be a good idea for all groups that do the same surveying for their own programs collaborate on the surveying. Then, each group will take the information gathered and use it to develop their own plans.

In our case, we need to know what all our community members are happy about or concerned about to develop our plans for ongoing mission. We have done this on our own before with varying results. Wouldn't it be nice to have someone help in the information gathering? This means one person helps with this other group instead of our forming an active committee at Prince of Life when we are focused on getting a permanent pastor.

What you will see sometime between October and January is a survey to fill out on what you love about our broader community (not Prince of Life), what needs to be changed, and what do you need now.
