Pastor's Press:

Wait for Jesus - Don't Wait to Do Good Works!

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As we enter the season of Advent, the rhythm of the new Church year gently invites us to slow down. While the world around us rushes into Christmas—sales, decorations, and celebrations before the day even arrives—Advent calls us **to wait, to watch,** and **to prepare** our hearts with expectations **not** To Do and Must-Have lists.

Waiting is not something most of us do easily – I am an impatient person myself at times. We live in a culture that prizes instant results, immediate responses, and quick solutions. Yet Scripture reminds us that God often works in the waiting. Israel waited generations for the promised Messiah. Mary waited, treasuring and pondering God's promises in her heart. The Church today waits for Christ's return, trusting that God's timing is always good.

Advent waiting is not passive, though. It is a hopeful, active kind of waiting. We light candles each week to proclaim that even the smallest light pushes back the darkness. We gather in worship

to hear again the promises of God. And we practice attentiveness—watching for ways Christ is already coming to us in Word and Sacrament, in our neighbor, and in the quiet moments of grace that fill our days.

Advent also reminds us not to overlook the gift of *giving and good works*. In waiting, we can become inwardly focused—thinking about what we need, what we lack, what we long for. But the season invites us to lift our eyes and see others who are waiting too: those waiting for hope, for comfort, for companionship, for daily bread. As Christ comes to us with overflowing mercy, we are called to let that mercy overflow through us.

Giving in Advent is not just about meeting material needs, though that certainly matters. It is also about giving time, attention, presence, encouragement, forgiveness, and love.

Advent Preaching Series

“Imagine Tomorrow: Promises in the Waiting”

This Advent, our preaching series will center on the powerful visions of Isaiah appointed in the Revised Common Lectionary for Year A. Isaiah speaks to a people who are waiting—often in uncertainty, fear, or exile—and yet he proclaims God’s steadfast promises. These ancient words meet us in our own waiting all month long.

Week 1 – Isaiah 2:1–5: The Mountain of Peace

Isaiah paints a picture of a world where nations stream to the mountain of the Lord, tools of war are reshaped into instruments of life, and God’s Word teaches us to walk in His ways. We begin Advent with this vision of hope: God is drawing the world toward God’s peace. In our waiting, we walk in the light of the Lord.

Week 2 – Isaiah 11:1–10: A Shoot from the Stump of Jesse

Into the ruins of a broken kingdom, Isaiah promises a new Branch—full of wisdom, justice, and righteousness. The Messiah brings harmony to creation itself. During the second week, we explore how God brings life out of what seems cut down, and how Christ’s reign restores what our world has lost.

Week 3 – Isaiah 35:1–10: Joy for the Wilderness

The desert blooms, the weak are strengthened, and the ransomed return with singing. Isaiah gives a vision of redemption that transforms even the driest places. In the third week of Advent, we look for signs of God’s joy breaking into our wildernesses and renewing our courage.

Week 4 – Isaiah 7:10–16: A Sign of Emmanuel

God gives a sign—a child named Emmanuel, “God with us.” As we draw near to Christmas, we hear the promise that God does not remain distant while we wait. God comes into our world, into our struggles, and into our lives. Our waiting ends in the presence of Christ, the God who is truly with us.

Child Care Advocacy Committee Update

Our group met as planned during Giving Thanks potluck on 11/16/25 with 3 members. We discussed the recent start of the New Mexico childcare voucher program. The Childcare Coalition of Clackamas County had not met yet, so we discussed what we thought of the start of universal Childcare Assistance in New Mexico on 11/1/25. In reviewing it we decided that they have a unique funding source that we don't believe exists in Oregon. New Mexico receives royalties and money for leases from both oil and gas production and the mineral excavation industries. They set up a fund to hold all these monies in an investment fund, much like our Mission Endowment Fund, using the interest only to fund education and other important community needs.

When the Coalition of Clackamas County met on 11/17/25, they discussed what has been happening in Oregon.

Two organizations were highlighted, Family Forward and Oregon ASK (Afterschool and Summer Care for Kids). One good idea mentioned was to frame this as a Working Families Issue. This doesn't just advocate something for low income people but for everyone with children. The Coalition pointed out that the main task of the Legislature is to find more sources of revenue to meet the State of Oregon's needs. Providing a better childcare scenario in the state could help do this by increasing the number of tax paying workers.

The Childcare Advocacy Committee will meet again on Sunday 12/21/25 during the Coffee Hour to discuss what we can do as a part of this.

What is a Resilience Hub?

Resilience Hubs are developed with and for community members, grounded in the needs and strengths of the surrounding area. Services may include:

- Shelter from extreme weather events
- Distribution of food or meals
- Providing first aid and emergency supplies
- Communication support for responders
- Climate resiliency protections

Beyond emergency support, Resilience Hubs foster local leadership, neighbor-to-neighbor support, and long-term recovery. Faith institutions, like POL, are uniquely positioned to lead in this work. With deep community trust and existing networks, our congregation could play a powerful role in activating local resilience.

EMO's goal is to listen, learn, and explore alignment with your mission and current community service efforts. Talk with Pastor Sena for more information.

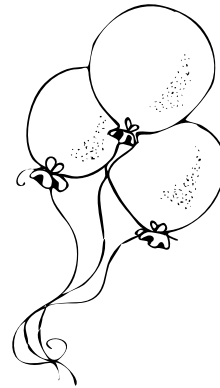
